REFLECTION

Living in the Future in the Present

The last three Sundays of the year invite us to look into the future. Though we are accustomed to think of the close of the Liturgical Year as the end, it is really an opening into the end-time, into the future. Each of the remaining Sundays flashes a spotlight of some aspect of what God is doing in preparation for this future. Today's Bible passages lead us to look at the question of resurrection and the manner of life we are to live in anticipation of it. The Sadducees insisted on understanding the next life as if it were merely a continuation of the present one. Jesus corrected this error in his answer to them. Jesus does not say what the future life will be like. He simply states that it will be different. The method of assuring the continuation of life will be radically transformed. What is clear is the assurance that our relation with God will continue. If this is the future that awaits us, how are we to live until it dawns on us? In fact, our future is already present by the grace given us from God through our Lord Jesus Christ. therefore called to live lives that have been radically transformed. We live both in this age and in the age to come. We live future lives, but we live them in the present. When we live lives of the future, we truly enable that future to dawn on us in the present.

The 32nd & 33rd Sundays in Ordinary Time

Christian faith and life and the Church's journey point toward the resurrection of the dead and the coming of the Son of Man. This faith is expressed in every Liturgical celebration.

We proclaim your Death, O Lord, and profess your Resurrection until you come again.

Each of us proclaims it in the Lord's Prayer

Our Father who art in heaven ...
They Kingdom come ...

One may wonder whether our daily life and the way we perceive the Church have much to do with this. However, the readings of the 32nd & 33rd Sundays, deal with death and life after death and the events related to the final victory of Christ. The Gospel According to Luke has drawn us, from Sunday to Sunday, on Jesus' journey to Jerusalem. Jerusalem, which we enter with Jesus, is not the end of a long earthly road. It is the city where the events in the Gospel are unfolded. The life of each Christian is a journey with Jesus, a participation in his Paschal life.

The whole liturgical year is symbolic. It takes place through the signs and sacraments - a journey which leads from the first revelation of God and his plan of salvation to the Passover of Christ, death, resurrection, ascension, drawing us along behind him. The fulfillment of all things is found in the return of the Lord. The First Sunday of Advent sets before our eyes, Jesus speaking to his disciples of his coming. This sets the background from the very beginning for the whole Liturgical year.
