REFLECTION

The blessing found in Numbers may be one of the oldest pieces of poetry in the Bible. Although it is the priests who ultimately bless the people, it is Moses who receives the blessing from God and who delivers it to Aaron and his sons (vv.22-23). Each line invokes a personal action from God: to bless with good fortune and to keep from harm; to look favorably toward and to be gracious; to look upon and to grant peace – the blessings that make life worth living.

The mission of Christ to the world is the major focus of Paul's teaching in the second reading. The designated time refers to that time in history when God brought the messianic expectations to fulfillment by sending his Son into the world. Referring to Christ as God's Son establishes his divine nature; acknowledging that he was born of a woman establishes his human nature.

In today's Gospel, Mary is the focus, not the child. It is Mary who is described as holding all these things in her heart. She is the one who ponders the significance of these events.

By her willingness to hold all these things in her heart, Mary becomes to Christians an inspiration of contemplation and reflection. She inspires us to consider deeply the significance of events rather than to go blindly through life without meaning or direction. She inspires us to constant reflection on the truths of the faith that continues to be made real in life's experiences. She inspires us to fidelity to the practices of our faith, practices which are the disciplines of souls that lead the community to a clearer focus on God's presence in human affairs.

50th World Day of Peace – January 1, 2017

Perhaps the best known Catholic contribution to responding to violent conflict is the just war tradition... Lesser known is our Catholic commitment to active non-violence and building a just peace. Seeking a just peace means preventing conflict by addressing its causes, building relationships, and facilitating healing and restoration. Pope Francis urges families, faith communities, government leaders, and the international community to practice non-violence and work to build a just peace.

The first of January has many observances: We mark the conclusion to the octave of Christmas; it is New Year's Day; we celebrate the Day of Prayer for World Peace; and we observe the solemnity of Mary, Mother of God.

Mary The God-bearer: The Church today celebrates Mary as the Mother of God. She is called *Theotokos* (God-bearer), for "God sent his Son born of a woman." Because Mary found favor with God, his Son took the flesh of Mary – it is thanks to her that Jesus is *fully* human with flesh like ours, except for sin, and also fully divine. Mary is the ultimate symbol of the Christian, for what is a Christian if not one who bears Christ within our world and brings him to people?

New Year's Day: On New Year's Day we gather together and realize that our lives are made of days and nights, of seasons and years. We mark ends and we make beginnings and, in all, we praise God for the grace and mercy that fill our days.

Prayer: *Remember us, O God, from age to age be our comforter. You have given us the wonder of time, blessings in days and nights, seasons and years. Bless your children at the turning of the year and fill the months ahead with the bright hope that is ours in the coming of Christ. You are our God, living and reigning, for ever and ever. Amen.*
