REFLECTION

“I Am The Good Shepherd”

On this Sunday, traditionally known as Good Shepherd Sunday, the readings offer us a magnificent meditation on salvation. The description of Jesus as shepherd falls into two distant yet related sections, each introduced by the self-proclamation “I am the Good Shepherd”.

The first section depicts Jesus as a conscientious shepherd who is willing to protect his flock even to the point of risking his own life for them.

The second section shows Jesus, the shepherd as intimately related to God. Jesus states that he has a mutual, intimate relationship with his sheep. He goes on to say that this relationship is based on the mutual, intimate relationship that he has with God. Jesus is willing to care for and die for other sheep, who though they are not yet included in his flock, are also his. Jesus is saying that there are other sheep that will recognize him and will then be brought into his flock. In the end there will be one flock and one shepherd. This shepherd continues his work in the world, calling those lost to come together to form one flock led by one pastor, in whose presence they can find rest and life.

PRAHA PANCAKE SUNDAY MAY 6



Reconciliation – A Good Sheering

Sheep are pictured as cute, clean little lambs – an adorable pet. In reality, sheep are not very bright and they need a lot of care including someone to guide them, shear them, care for hoofs, and dock their tails. Instinctively, sheep will follow each other and try to stay together. If they are separated, they will work desperately to return to the flock. When we hear the parable of the lost sheep, it may not dawn on us that the lone sheep may have been trying to find his way back to Jesus, the Good Shepherd. There is a picture that floats around on the internet of “Shrek the Sheep” who was lost in the rocks and crags for over six years. He was almost unrecognizable, and could barely see, because he was so overgrown. When sheered, his wool weighed sixty pounds compared to the average ten. *It is a powerful metaphor for what happens when we become estranged from God for a long time, and burdened with our sins. Reconciliation serves as a good sheering.*
